DUTIES & RESPONSIBILITIES

- Compound prescribed pharmaceutical products by calculating, measuring and mixing the quantities of drugs and other ingredients required
- Dispense prescribed pharmaceuticals to customers or to other health care professionals and advise them on drug interactions and dosage
- Maintain medication profiles of customers including registry of narcotic and controlled drugs
- Ensure proper preparation, packaging, distribution and storage of vaccines, serums, biologicals and other drugs and pharmaceuticals
- Order and maintain stock of pharmaceutical supplies
- Advise customers on selection and use of non-prescription medication

WHAT YOU'LL NEED Educational Requirements

- Bachelor's degree in Pharmacy required, and must pass an exam by the Pharmacy Examining Board of Canada
- 1,000-hr. internship or apprenticeship required for full licensure
- WHMIS training required
- First aid and advanced cardiac life support certifications are beneficial, but not required
- Retail pharmacists who plan to establish their own practices often take accounting and other business courses
